This year, FLM Haiti marks 40 years of service.

or all of 2023, the nonprofit is celebrating with "The Power of Love," a campaign to commemorate FLM Haiti's 40th anniversary. We have special events, reunions, community programming, and a year of prayers. With your generosity, it is FLM's goal to raise \$200,000 to support the ministry, care and services we provide in Haiti.

For nearly four decades, the nonprofit has dedicated itself to helping Haitians help themselves. This mission has driven FLM's efforts across education, health care, trade skills and other advancements to enable the residents in the communities we serve to be more proud, more dignified and stronger citizens of Haiti.

On many dimensions, FLM Haiti is a remarkable story of love.

It is a story of love between a man and a woman. It was founded by Bishop Leon Pamphile and his wife, Rozelle, both natives of Haiti. Leon was a young and studious Christian when he met Rozelle, who had dedicated herself to the Lord. She was living in an orphanage. The couple married and eventually resettled in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

It is a story of love of country. The Pamphiles never forgot the needs of their homeland, creating FLM as a way to give back. FLM took root in the very community where Leon lived and roamed as a child. Today, the people of LaBoule, Thomassin and other areas benefit from a K-13 grade school, a technical school, and a clinic.

It is the story of the love of the stranger. Over the years, hundreds of mission people – nurses, ministers, doctors, teachers, writers—have come to Haiti, sharing their gifts and talents to teach, heal, and pray. They don't know the Haitian people when they arrive, but after sharing food and love, when they leave everyone becomes brother and sister.

Finally, it is the story of the love of God surmounting obstacles. The challenges in Haiti are many: political and social instability is on the rise; natural disasters, and high rates of poverty and illiteracy fuel what seems like unrelenting obstacles. In recent years, COVID-19 and the return of cholera have exacerbated the challenges. Yet, in the face of adversity, FLM, powered by the love of God, with its dedicated supporters and sacrificing and preserving employees and staff in Haiti, soldiers on.

Excelsior Technical Institute, Passing on the Tools to Build a Better Future

n humid afternoons, when school is out, **Saincal Renestil** busies himself at his administrative desk. He is reviewing schedules, supply ledgers, enrollment forms and also

electrical layouts that are designed to test students' competency at learning and applying this trade skill.

Renestil is director of one of the newest initiatives at FLM, the Excelsior Technical Institute, or ETI, which serves to empower and prepare Haiti's citizens with the critical technical skills needed to help rebuild the nation. It is one of the few institutions of higher education in this area of Haiti.

On occasion, Renestil also teaches in ETI's electrical training. He fills in when the principal instructor can't be there, and works to ensure

that the students remain on schedule and up to par. The layouts are among the key projects that electrical students must complete to graduate. Renestil is careful with his review because he wants to create a project that measures the mastery of the students' work.

Renestil is from Thomassin, the same community where ETI is located, an area about a 40-minute drive from downtown Port au Prince, Haiti's capital. He studied electricity at the Haiti Center for Professional Training, which specializes in vocational skills, and then went to the well-regarded University of the Renaissance Haiti to study administration and management in Port-au-Prince before working as an engineer and teacher.

He has served as director of ETI since 2014 and despite the recent uptick in political and social unrest, and pandemic worries, he has helped the school to remain open, and looks forward to moving all of the students toward better lives.

After their study at ETI, says Renestil, almost all of the students find jobs. Two recent graduates, **Exantus Athanael** and **Desir Saint Hilaire**, are planning to create their own electrical installation company.

There are now about 52 students at the school. They are enrolled in a variety of classes to develop construction and technical skills, including electrical wiring, plumbing, and computer technology. These skills are applied to real-world applications such as auto repair and commercial and residential construction as a part of the technical project requirement for graduation. However, before students graduate from their programs, they must complete three courses in their subject and a designated technical project.

In recent years, ETI has developed courses in tile work, culinary skills, tailoring and window installation and fabrication.

Renestil is passionate about using knowledge and with people helping people to create a well-rounded community for all.
